Variety Information

Blueberries:

Need at least 2 varieties for cross-pollination. Plant in full sun with good drainage. Plant 6 - 8 feet apart in a row.

| Climax | <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Ripens early to mid June.• Medium size berry• Plants habit is upright and open. |
| Pink Lemonade | <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Hybrid cross between a southern rabbiteye and northern highbush varieties• Medium sized, bright pink berries that ripen in late July• Very flavorful and sweet• Thought to be self-fertile, however the U.S.D.A. recommends cross-pollination with rabbiteye blueberry varieties |

Blackberries:

Thornless upright (do not require trellising) plants can bear up to 7 weeks. Plants do not require cross-pollinating. Recommended plant spacing is 3-5 feet apart.

Raspberries:

Does not require cross-pollinating. Plant 6-10 feet apart in a row.

Muscadines:

2-year old plants sold in 1-gallon containers. Self-pollinating.

(black) | <ul style="list-style-type: none">• 19% sugar• Excellent size and production• Good fruit quality with edible skin• Ripens early to midseason• Great for jams, jellies, and wine |
| Tara
(bronze) | <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Disease resistant• 17% sugar• Excellent pollinator• Ripens mid-season• Excellent for all uses |

Strawberries:

Bundle of 25 bare-root plants. June-bearing.

Jewel

- Midseason variety.
- Large berries with superb quality and flavor.
- Performs well over a wide range of growing conditions.
- Plants have moderate winter hardiness.

Earliglow

- Medium size.
- Sweet flavor.
- Fruit size tends to decrease as the season progresses.
- Plants are very vigorous and runner well.
- Good disease resistance.
- Recommended for beginners.

Seedless Grapes:

Plant 10 feet apart.

Thompson
(Green)

- One of the most popular table grapes.
- White grape
- Large clusters
- Likes hot summers

Mars
(Blue/Purple)

- Blue grapes-high in vigor and yield.
- Medium clusters-Excellent flavor similar to Concord
- Likes hot summers
- Disease resistant

Goji Berry

Easy to grow. Drought resistant. Bears in 1-2 years. Bright orange-red berries.

- Extremely Healthy – Superfood
- Slightly sweet, mildly tangy flavor
- Eat fresh or made into juice or wine
- Ripens late summer through fall

Asparagus:

Easy to grow. Comes in bundles of 10.

Mary Washington

- Rust resistant
- Produces large, tender shoots.
- Stalks are straight dark green tinged with purple

Rhubarb:

One bareroot crown. Plant in well drained soil in full sun.

Victoria

- Very sweet
- Considered one of the best!
- Grows fast.
- Great for rhubarb pie

Fruit Trees

Apples:

Two-year old, bare-root trees. Need two varieties for pollination.
Plant 12-16 feet apart.

| Fuji | <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Medium to large fruit• Popular fresh eating apple• Firm, crunchy, juicy white flesh with excellent flavor.• Ripens early to mid September• Good storage quality |
| McIntosh | <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Medium to large fruit• Tender and sweet flesh with thin skin• Excellent for making cider• Very productive and resistant to apple cedar rust |
| Gala | <ul style="list-style-type: none">• medium sized with golden-yellow skin and a red-orange blush.• flesh is firm, sweet, crisp and juicy.• stores very well.• ripens late August through early September.• Disease resistant |

Peaches:

3 – 5 foot bareroot. Cross pollination is not required.

Figs:

Plant 15 - 20 feet apart. Grows best in well-drained soil. Plant in full sun. Bears fruit in 3 years. Self-Fertile. Ripens late summer (July-August)

Hazelnut:

Need two varieties for pollination. Full production is reached in approximately 6 years. Harvest in September & October.

Clark

- Developed by Oregon State University
- Nuts are free-husking, have a high percent kernel and blanch well
- EFB (eastern filbert blight) resistant

Jefferson

- Developed by Oregon State University
- Extremely insect resistant
- Completely immune to Filbert Blight disease
- Produces heavy yields of large hazelnuts
- Low maintenance

Persimmon:

3 – 4 foot, bareroot tree. “Non-Astringent” varieties can be eaten while the flesh is crisp. Start to produce in approximately 3 years. Full harvest in about 6 years. Plant in full sun and well-drained soil. Plant 25 – 30 feet apart. Cross-pollination is required.

Hana-Fuyu

- Huge fruit, full of flavor
- Orange fruit with a tinge of red
- Very sweet
- Ornamental tree that turns orange and red in the fall

Jiro

- Has deep orange skin that is firm and juicy
- Great flavor, high quality fruit
- Ripens mid to late October

Combination Trees

Combination Plum

- Semi-dwarf
- Highly disease resistant
- Excellent choice for small spaces
- Includes four of the following varieties:
Burbank, Damson, Italian, Santa Rosa, Satsuma, Shiro or Stanley

Fruit Salad

- Harvest up to 4 different fruits from one tree
- All fruits retain their own qualities
- Self-pollinating
- Grows up to 15 feet tall
- Fruit Salad tree will include up to four of the following five varieties:
Peach: Gold Dust
Peach: July Elberta
Apricot: Blenheim
Plum: Late Santa Rosa
Nectarine: Independence
