Tour of Blue Ridge Food Ventures

Blue Ridge Food Ventures (BRFV), an initiative of Advantage West Economic Development Group and the North Carolina Department of Agriculture, is a shared-use, value-added food processing center centrally located in Asheville to serve food entrepreneurs throughout western North Carolina. It provides services to those wishing to start or grow small businesses in the food industry, to local farmers who wish to add value to their products through processing, and to caterers and bakers needing a certified kitchen. This regional "kitchen incubator," a first for North Carolina, joins others throughout the U.S. in spurring the development of small businesses, promoting local agriculture and creating jobs.

Tour of NC State Research Station in Fletcher

Take an outdoor wagon ride and learn first hand about the research taking place in apple, tomato, herb and ornamental crop production. Project leaders or their technicians will facilitate an overview of the work being done at each site visited - orchard, field, garden, etc. - and explain how their research will eventually affect product quality and selection as well as the consumer's pocketbooks. Each instructional segment of the tour will last approximately 15 minutes. FCS Agents will be encouraged to contribute insight, pose questions and share comments.

Indian Village

This village is an authentic replica of an 18th century Cherokee community. Cherokee guides explain the history, culture and life-style of their ancestors. Watch Cherokee craftsmen demonstrate their skill in making arrowheads, baskets, blowguns, beaded belts, ceremonial masks, dugout canoes, pottery, and wood carvings. You'll also enjoy the replica of a 7-sided Council House and typical Cherokee homes as they were 250 years ago. Adjacent to the Village is the mile-long Nature Trail that provides visitors the opportunity to walk through the woods and see a variety of trees, plants and flowers indigenous to the western North Carolina area.

Museum of the Cherokee Indian

"To perpetuate the history, culture, and stories of the Cherokee people"

To accomplish this mission, the museum maintains a permanent exhibit, extensive artifact collection, archives, education programs, artist series, and a gift shop. The museum also publishes the Journal of Cherokee Studies.

The Museum of the Cherokee Indian opened in 1948 and moved to its present facility in 1976. Its exhibit was totally renovated in 1998, when a new 12,000 square foot exhibit was installed. The museum is a non-profit organization with 501(c)3 status, and it operates self-sufficiently based on admissions revenue and gift shop sales.

Let's Go Downtown: The Revitalization of Downtown Waynesville

Buffy Phillips Messer, Executive Director of the downtown Waynesville Association will share the history, the process, the do's & don't's, and the economic importance of Waynesville's successful downtown revitalization project.

The mission of the Downtown Waynesville Association is to undertake revitalization activities within the Service District and downtown area based on the guidelines of the North Carolina and National Main Street Programs, while preserving and sustaining the social, cultural, economic and historic role of the downtown as the center of the Waynesville community.

Tour of NC Arboretum

The Arboretum focuses on the education, economic development, research, conservation, and garden demonstration with respect to landscape, architecture, and plant sciences.

The 434-acre site is nestled in one of the most beautiful natural settings in the United States. Mountain peaks bound the property's visual perimeters and 1.8 miles of the Bent Creek stream run through the center of the Arboretum. Enjoy a guided tour through the Heritage, Mountain Spring, Bonsai, Quilt and Plants of Promise Gardens.
