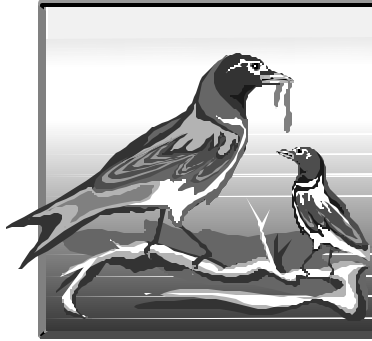

About the Workshops

The objective of these workshops is to introduce natural resource professionals, forest landowners, and others to bird identification by sight and sound, and to the ecology of migratory and resident birds of North Carolina. Each workshop will explore management techniques that benefit Neotropical migratory and resident birds associated with each geographical region. Much of the workshop will be spent in the field, working on bird identification in a variety of habitat types. Classroom sessions will augment the field training.

Who Should Attend?

These workshops will be valuable to forestry and natural resources professionals who want to incorporate management techniques that benefit forests and the migratory species that forests harbor at various times during the year. Forest landowners will benefit from learning how they can positively influence the migratory and resident bird habitat on their property. Bird enthusiasts in general will enhance their understanding of birds and bird ecology in the region.

About the Instructors

Mark Johns works for the NC Wildlife Resources Commission as the NC Coordinator for Partners in Flight, a program that focuses on conservation of migratory birds throughout the Americas. Mark has been an instructor in the Department of Forestry at NC State University since 1990 and was formerly the Chief Naturalist at Hemlock Bluffs Nature Preserve in Cary, NC.

Chris Moorman is an Assistant Professor and Forestry Extension Specialist at NC State University. Chris works with professionals and private landowners interested in the effects of forestry practices on wildlife. During the past ten years he has conducted several research projects to investigate potential effects of forest management on birds.

CFE Credits

Each of these workshops will offer 6 contact hours of Category 1 Continuing Forestry Education credits authorized by the Society of American Foresters.

Registration and Fees

The registration fee is \$65 per workshop. This includes course handouts, refreshments, and lunch.

Registration deadline is April 16th. Enrollment in each workshop is limited to the first 30 registrants.

Cancellations made by April 16 will receive a refund less a \$20 service charge.

Workshop Locations and Lodging

The **Piedmont** workshop will take place in the Hill Demonstration Forest, off Highway 15-501 in Bahama, NC (Durham County). The **Upper Coastal Plain** workshop will be held at Howell Woods Environmental Learning Center in Four Oaks, NC. The **Mountain** workshop will take place at the Rendezvous Mountain Educational State Forest, near Wilkesboro, NC. A map indicating the location of the workshop you wish to attend and local lodging establishments will be included with your registration confirmation letter. Lodging is not included.
