

National 4-H Conference



On March 24, 2012, I embarked on the journey of a lifetime. An annual tradition since 1927, National 4-H Conference equips 4-H'ers from ages 15-19 with development in leadership and professional skills by learning more about our government on a national level.

During this six day trip, I was able to meet with Senator Kay Hagan and Congressman Howard Coble. The 4-H delegates from all across the United States and Puerto Rico, listened to members of the Obama administration speak on technology and agriculture.
