2013 Adult Education Seminars

All seminars are held from 11am -12 noon in the Arboretum. All seminars are free to attend and require registration by calling 336-703-2850.

January 16 – Winter Walk - Toby Bost, of Bost Consulting and former Arboretum Director, will lead us in an informative walk through the Arboretum, identifying different trees and some shrubs. He will discuss the attributes of each tree or shrub and how they provide winter interest in your home landscape.

Location: Entrance to Arboretum

February 6 – Conifers in the Landscape - Rob Means, Director of the Conifer Ridge Botanical Gardens, will discuss the attributes of conifers in the landscape. You will discover how to use conifers as year-round "bones" in your landscape. Location: Arboretum Office

March 20 – Raised Bed Gardening - Mary Jac Brennan, Extension Agent-Community Gardens, will discuss the benefits of raised garden beds built on top of your native soil. See how you can plant anything from herbs and vegetables to perennials and shrubs in a raised bed. Location: Arboretum Office

Seminars Held During the Annual Spring Plant Sale

All seminars will be held at 11am at the location listed.

While you are here, you can check out the plants that are for sale in the Arboretum Greenhouse and Nursery.

The plant sale will be held Tuesday, April 9th - Saturday, April 13th from 10am to 2pm each day.

April 9 – Tried and True Annuals - Sherry Sunday, Master Gardener Volunteer, will discuss growing annuals that have been successful in the gardens at Tanglewood. The discussion will include how annuals can be used to "punch up" color in the landscape. Many of the plants will be available for purchase at the plant sale. Location: Arboretum Office

April 10 – Wild Flower Walk - Master Gardener Curators Anne Hester and Peg Simm will lead a tour of the wildflower garden and identify flowers blooming along the trails. Location: Entrance to Arboretum

April 11 – Cooking with Herbs - Cynthia Bouldin, Master Gardener Volunteer, will discuss growing and harvesting herbs for cooking as well as how to cook with a selection of essential culinary herbs that can make your meals sizzle! Location: Arboretum Office

April 12 – Organics in the Landscape - Craig Mauney and Mary Jac Brennan, Extension Agents, will discuss using organics in the landscape. The organic gardener prefers to use natural and organic materials and methods to grow vegetables, flowers and even the lawn. Learn how to use the least amount of synthetic chemicals and learn about practices that may be detrimental to your health or the environment. Location: Arboretum Office

April 13 – Tour of the Arboretum - Craig Mauney, Arboretum Director, will lead us on a tour of the Arboretum. As we walk through the Arboretum Gardens you will discover interesting trees, shrubs and flowers you may want to add to your existing landscape. Location: Arboretum Office

May 1 – Garden Photography Basics - Mark Weir, avid photographer, will lead a class on getting good photos of gardens and flowers. The class will include how to set up and frame the shot, photo composition, lighting and camera settings. Location: Arboretum Office

June 5 – Edible Landscapes - Adrienne Roethling, Garden Curator at Paul Ciener Botanical Garden, will present a program on incorporating herbs and vegetables in the home landscape. She will also talk about some unusual vegetables and what they have done at the Ciener Botanical Gardens with vegetables in the landscape. Location: Arboretum Office

July 10 – Hydrangeas - Diane Demers-Smith, artist, floral designer and Master Gardner Volunteer, will present a program on growing hydrangeas. She will cover selection of plants for the site, pruning, pH issues, and preservation of the blooms. Location: Arboretum Office

August 21 – Heirloom Flowers in the Modern Garden - David Bare, Horticulturist with Reynolda Gardens and *Winston-Salem Journal* garden columnist, will discuss how we have changed heirlooms to fit a more modern concept of how a landscape 'should' be. He will point out some great underutilized plants as well as share some of his experiences in heirloom gardens at Old Salem and Reynolda Gardens. Location: Arboretum Office

September 4 – What You Need to Know to Grow Roses - Jimmy Speas of the Winston-Salem Rose Society will discuss about a dozen things you need to know to grow roses. Location: Arboretum Office

October 2 – Growing Blueberries in the Home Landscape - Bill Colvin, Master Gardener Volunteer, will discuss how to grow blueberries successfully and have a good yield. Preparing the soil, needed amendments like fertilizer, how many shrubs you need, pruning and harvesting are all to be discussed in this program.

November 6 – Holiday Containers - Teresa Myers, one of the owners of Myers Greenhouses, will demonstrate how to create festive containers for the holiday season. She will also discuss the care and maintenance of container gardens. Location: Arboretum Office
