
> grandparent, someone at your church, a co-worker of your parent, or anyone you may know who was in 4-H.



Application/Resume/Interview/Essay (ARIE) due May 10



If you plan on applying for a National 4-H trip, your applications, resumes and essays need to be turned into Alamance County by Friday, May 10. This process is for 4-Hers who are 14 or older and have at least 2 years of 4-H experience. There is also a mock process for 11-13 year olds. If you are interested, please let me know and I'll be glad to fill you in! National 4-H trips are awarded to 4-Hers who participate in this program and are selected based upon their application, resume, interview and essay scores. National trips include National 4-H Congress (Atlanta, GA), National 4-H Conference (Washington, DC), and International Leadership Conference (choice of Vermont or Michigan). We have had several 4-Hers from Alamance County attend all of these events and they've had a blast! I even went to National 4-H Congress when I was 16 and had an awesome time and made lots of friends! Participants will receive \$15 of scholarship money for participating, but must go through the whole ARIE process.

4-H is partnering with Tractor Supply Company to raise money for our local 4-H programs. I hope you will promote this campaign as it draws closer. All you have to do is purchase a paper clover at the checkout for \$1 and 50% of the proceeds will come right back here to Alamance County 4-H. But you have to go to the Tractor Supply on Garden Road in



Burlington, because that's in Alamance County. If you go to a Tractor Supply in another county, the money will go to that county's 4-H program. Last fall, we raised \$330, so that means we sold 660 clovers! The winning county in the US raised almost \$3,000 (from Texas)! Let's show Texas that North Carolina is just as awesome!

There is also the option to purchase a \$5 clover this year. Any clubs that are interested in setting up an information table during this time frame should contact Tractor Supply directly. This would be a great opportunity for any livestock and/or horse clubs. Customers might be more willing to purchase a clover if they actually see 4-Hers in action!



District & State Horse Bowl Report
