



4-H Congress Update



Kim Eckmann also attended as a wonderful volunteer!

There were several young people from Alamance County who achieved great accomplishments. Malik King and Zoe Steenwyk gave their presentations at the State Finals on **Saturday**, **June 22** and Zoe received Gold for her Foods & Nutrition presentation in the 9-10 age category. In addition, Daniel Osborne was tapped into the NC 4-H Honor Club, which is the highest honor a NC 4-Her can achieve. The mission of this lifelong club is service to others. Elizabeth Kenney was selected to represent North Carolina

as a delegate to National 4-H Congress in Atlanta, GA through the ARIE competition (Application/Resume/Interview/Essay).

Changes in Upcoming Events

Due to the vacant 4-H Agent position, there are several events that will be changed or cancelled this fall. Laurie Newlin, our 4-H Secretary will be in communication with you about upcoming events and activities. Please be sure to read her emails CAREFULLY!

Details are listed below.

- <u>Nutrition Fair</u>—We are cancelling the Nutrition Fair until a new 4-H Agent is hired. That person will be responsible for setting the date and making sure you get the details. The Nutrition Fair is an event which requires a lot of planning, and is difficult to organize without a 4-H Agent.
- <u>County Council</u>—The next County Council Meeting is scheduled for **Tuesday**, **August 20**th, and will be held at May Memorial Library at 6:30 pm. The program will be on completing the 4-H Achievement Plan, so if you are interested, please come and learn more! The Achievement Plan is a great way to set goals AND earn scholarship money!
- **Fall Leader Meeting**—This meeting is being cancelled since the 4-H Agent is the person who plans and organizes this meeting. Once a new agent is in place, they will contact you about any upcoming training.
- <u>Fall Fundraisers</u>—Until a new agent is hired, there won't be a fall plant sale or wreath sale. There will probably be a Tractor Supply Paper Clover Drive this fall, so be sure to promote that fundraiser.

4-H Alumni Interview Project





In our last newsletter, I challenged you 4-Hers to find someone who was in 4-H years ago and interview them about what it was like when they were 4-Hers. Even though I will now be in Person County, I encourage you to continue the 4-H Alumni Interview Project.

I want you to chat with these former 4-Hers about their experiences in 4-H and if possible, video tape these interviews. If some are unable to video the interviews, at least try to record them and write them down. That way we can at least have a written account. It would also be great if you could provide your own comments and thoughts after you've conducted your interviews.
