2013 Southern Regionals 4-H Horse Championships

The morning of July 28th dawned bright and clear as the NC Horse Bowl and Hippology delegation left Raleigh to head down to West Monroe, Louisiana for the 2013 Southern Regionals 4-H Horse Championships. It was an exciting year for Alamance County, as three of the Southern Alamance Horse Club members were competing on the horse bowl team. Rachel Rezin, Alexandria Knudson,

and I were excited and honored to be representing our club, county, and state. We competed at the district and state level and gualified individually to try out for the state team. It's not an easy road, and countless hours of studying have been poured into this.

The horse bowl contest, in which questions range from "what color is a double dilution of chestnut? {cremello}" to "what are the three species of the bot fly that infests horses? {gastrophilus intestinalis, gastrophilus hemorrhoidalis, and gastrophilus nasalis}", is in a format similar to

Jeopardy!. Each member of the four person team has a buzzer and races against time and the other team to answer the questions asked by the moderator. A word of caution - don't ever underestimate the intensity of an "educational contest".

After our 16-hour drive on Sunday, Monday was spent studying...and visiting the Duck Commander warehouse. The horse bowl competition started at 1:30 on Tuesday afternoon, so we headed over after lunch to what would be a very long afternoon.

Several hours and countless rounds of guestions later, our team {comprised of the three of us and a Durham County 4-Her, Savana Everhart} emerged victorious as we defeated Texas to claim the 2013 Horse Bowl Championship title. It was such a great experience to practice under experienced horse professionals throughout the summer, compete at the regional level, travel across the southeast, meet other 4-Hers, and in this case, meet the Robertson's from Duck Dynasty. Horses are my passion, and although it took a lot of work to get to this point, I don't regret any of it. 4-H has taught me so much about choosing something to pursue, and the value of working hard to achieve that goal.

The team members will also learn how to make and defend their decisions in judging beef cattle, sheep, meat goats, and swine. 2013 National Wildlife Habitat Education Program Competition

<u>NC 4-H WHEP team competed at the</u> <u>National WHEP competition in Indiana</u>: Christy Bailey, Nathan Troxler, Emma Bailey, Courtney Eckmann, Zachary Weidemann, and Kim Eckmann This past July, I had the opportunity to represent North Carolina and compete, with three other Dogwood Club members, in the National WHEP (Wildlife Habitat Education Program) competition, hosted by Purdue University, in Trafalgar, Indiana. WHEP introduces students to the fields of wildlife management, wildlife biology and conservation practices. Our team consisted of Nathan Troxler, Emma Bailey, Zachary Weidemann, and myself. Our team's coaches were Christy Bailey and Kim Eckmann.

Our team studied together once a week for the state competition, which was May 11, and continued that study practice until July 19, when the team left for Indiana. The team made a stop in Kentucky and toured Mammoth Cave, the day before. The competition began on July 21, when we arrived that afternoon we got settled into our bunk house. Dinner and a presentation, from all the states involved, was first on the agenda. Each team had to stand in front of the other teams and talk about what was interesting/important about their state. We then moved on to the "share fair." Every state brought items that are produced in their state like food, candy, drinks, state

pins, pencils, and flags were some of the items. Our team brought Cheerwine, Pepsi, Texas Pete items, NASCAR memorabilia, NC peanuts, and, of course, our state flag lapel pin. Our second day, we went to Morgan-Monroe State Forest and toured different wildlife habitats and learned more in-depth wildlife practices and from a Purdue University's 100 year study of this particular forest. We also participated in wildlife skills. Our team got to shoot tranquilizer guns, learn how to locate using GPS, how pond management happens (shocking fish in ponds) and we worked with a special type of radio and frequency to locate things.

The actual competition was on July 23. All the team members were bussed, without the coaches, to a field site and were given a scenario on a piece of land that they had to write up a practice plan, which showed how to increase certain plants, animals, and remove the vegetation and animals that may hurt that particular piece of land. Parts of the competition were done as a team, some as an individual.

After participating in the WHEP program for the past four years, I have a better appreciation and knowledge of the management of land. I would have to say that this competition was one of the biggest highlights of my summer.
