Summer SHINE! \$

Alamance County 4-H Summer SHINE is a fun and educational program sponsored by Alamance County 4-H through the NC Cooperative Extension Service. Most of the activities will be held at the Alamance County Cooperative Extension Office.

To enroll in any Alamance County 4-H Summer SHINE Program/Class you must fill out the registration form, found at this link <u>http://go.ncsu.edu/</u> <u>summershine2014</u>, a 4-H Enrollment form, and a <u>notarized</u> 4-H Medical



Release Form. Erin Bain, Laurie Newlin, or Beverly Jenkins can notarize the 4-H Medical Release form in our office at no charge at the time of your appointment. You should also review the 4-H Code of Conduct with your child(ren) so they can be aware of those behavior guidelines. Registration for enrolled Alamance 4-H families will be the week of **May 12-16**, and registration for the public with be the week of **May 19-23**. Registration will be by appointment only between 8:30 am and 4:00 pm, Monday through Friday, and will be accepted in person only. NO mail, phone, or e-mail registrations will be allowed. Appointments will be 30 minutes per family and you can only register for children for whom you are a parent or guardian. You may call (336) 570-6740 or come by the Extension Office to set-up an appointment.

Application/Resume/Interview/Essay



If you plan on applying for a National 4-H trip, your applications, resumes and essays need to be turned into Alamance County by Friday, May 9. This process is for 4-Hers who are 14 or older and have at least 2 years of 4-H experience. There is also a mock process for 11-13 year olds. National 4-H trips are awarded to 4-Hers who participate in this program and are selected based upon their application, resume, interview and essay scores. National trips include National 4-H Congress (Atlanta, GA), National 4-H Conference (Washington, DC), and International Leadership Conference (choice of Vermont or Michigan). We have had several 4-Hers from Alamance County attend all of these events and they've had a blast! Participants will receive \$15 of scholarship money for participating, but must go through the whole ARIE process.



NC 4-H Congress Saturday–Tuesday, June 21-24, 2014

The N.C. State 4-H Congress is an annual educational event sponsored by the 4-H Youth Development Department at N.C. State University and planned by the State 4-H Council. This program is a great opportunity for teens to develop leadership and other life skills and have a great time as well! Youth will travel to Raleigh with others from Alamance County, but will have many opportunities to network with other 4-Hers from around the State during educational workshops as well as fun activities.

Ages: 4-H Congress is open to all youth ages 13 and up as of January 1, 2014.

Dates: The dates for Congress are Saturday-Tuesday, June 21-24, 2014

Locations:

* We are working to have presentations on NC State's Campus.

* The candlelighting ceremony will be at Dorton Arena.

* All other events will be at the Jane S. McKimmon Center.

Cost: Full Time Registration for Alamance County will be \$240. This will include your registration, transportation, lodging, and the following meals: Lunch Saturday, Breakfast Sunday, Breakfast Monday, Lunch Monday, Dinner Monday, Breakfast Tuesday, and Lunch Tuesday. Youth will need to bring spending money to cover additional meals and any incidentals throughout the trip. You can used Alamance 4-H Scholarship money to attend 4-H Congress. Contact Laurie to find out how much you have in your account! We will accept payment for Congress in installments, but the full balance must be paid by June 16th.

Housing: We will be staying in the dorms at NC State University in Lee Hall.
