Grapes

{Potted 1st year plants}	Quantity	Total Cost
Concord ~ Deep purple, exceptionally sweet fruits for eating fresh or juice and jelly. Self-pollinating; Ripens in mid-September.		
Flame ~ Produces medium-sized clusters of large, sweet, juicy, seedless grapes. Ripens in August. Self-pollinating.		
Niagara White ~ Very sweet taste, terrific for fresh eating, jelly or making your own wine. Ripens mid to late September.

{Potted 1st year plants}	Quantity	Total Cost
Cumberland Black Raspberry ~ Produces medium-large, blue-black berries with an outstanding raspberry flavor. Good for eating fresh, or making jams and jellies. Ripens July - August.		
Dorman Red Raspberry ~ Produces good quantities of large, firm, juicy, red fruit, very good either fresh or frozen. Ripens mid-June.

Blackberries

{Potted 1st year plants}	Quantity	Total Cost
Navaho (Thornless) ~ Glossy black berries, sweeter and firmer than previous thornless varieties, with smaller seed size. Also very winter hardy. This Patented variety requires little maintenance. No wires or trellis needed. Ripens early to mid June.

Blueberries

When planting blueberries, it is recommended to plant at least 2 varieties to ensure cross-pollination.

	Quantity	Total Cost
Climax ~ (Rabbiteye Type) Early ripening, produces medium-size berries with sweet flavor. Plants are upright with intense green foliage. One of the very best for harvesting.		
Premier ~ (Rabbiteye Type) Early to mid-season, large fruit. Excellent flavor, light blue in color and good quality. Plants are upright with good foliage. Highly productive.		
Southland ~ (Rabbiteye Type) Ripens in late June and is a wonderful mid-season selection. Tend to be sweeter than other mid-season rabbiteye blueberry varieties. Produces very large quantities of blueberries		
Tifblue ~ (Rabbiteye Type) Mid-season ripening, produces medium to large berries with good color. Plants are semi-upright with moderately vigorous growth. *Self-fertile*

Elberta ~ Most popular of all peaches. This yellow freestone is juicy, ideal for eating, canning and freezing. August harvest. Self-pollinating

{6-7 foot in 3 gallon container}	Quantity	Total Cost
Carolina Red June ~ Produces brilliant red, smaller than average fruits that may be round, slightly oblong or conical. Full flavored, early ripening. Fruits boast a dark red skin and fine-grained white flesh that may stain with red after the skin is broken. Ripens in late June / early July.		
Pink Lady ~ An ideal dessert apple. Bears medium-size fruit with rich yellow skin blushed with pink. Apples have a unique flavor — the first bite is tart, followed by delicious sweetness. Ripens in late October. Pollinates well with Fuji, Gala or Granny Smith		
Red Delicious ~ The most popular apple planted in the U.S. Produces a medium to large, deep red apple which exhibits juicy white flesh. This apple is used for eating fresh off the tree and commonly used in desserts. Ripens in September. Suggested pollinators are Granny Smith, Liberty, Golden Delicious, Fuji and Gala.		
Yellow Delicious ~ Large golden apple that ripens late with a fine, sweet flavor. Home use for eating, pies, sauces, and preserves. Pollinate with Red Delicious, Red Jonathan or Early Harvest

Pear Trees

{6-7 foot in 3 gallon container}	Quantity	Total Cost
Keiffer ~ Oval-shaped, large, yellow fruit with a crisp, juicy and coarse-like white flesh. Grows at a fast rate, produces fruit in late September.		
Seckel ~ Small dessert pears. Also called a sugar or candy pear. Fruit is super sweet with a hint of spice. Ripens in mid September.

Herbs

\$5 per plant or 3 for \$12

	Quantity	Total Cost
<u>Chives (Garlic)</u> ~ Source of vitamin A. Combines the flavor of onion & garlic. Uses: Appetizers, cream soups, fish, salads, egg and cheese dishes, sauces		
<u>Chives (Onion)</u> ~ Source of vitamin A. Lends a delicate onion flavor. Uses: Appetizers, cream soups, fish, salads, egg and cheese dishes, sauces		
<u>Lemon Balm</u> ~ Mint-like leaves, also called balm. Sweet, lemon flavor with a citrus scent. Uses: Jams and jellies, salads, soups, teas		
<u>Lemon Verbena</u> ~ Use in potpourris; herb pillows; lemon flavoring for drinks, salads, and jellies; teas.		
<u>Mint (Chocolate)</u> ~ Leaves smell and taste like mint and chocolate. Used like any mint plant in drinks, salads, desserts, sauces or as a garnish.		
<u>Mint (Grapefruit)</u> ~ Bright green leaves boast a taste that resembles spearmint with a twist of unsweetened grapefruit. Use fresh or dried leaves for garnish or in beverages, fruit salads, dessert		
<u>Mint (Peppermint)</u> ~ Used in drinks, salads, desserts, sauces or as a garnish. Attractive to butterflies; fragrant		
<u>Oregano</u> ~ Strong, aromatic with a pungent "pizza" flavor. Uses: Fish, meat, poultry, tomato sauces; Greek, Italian and Mexican recipes		
<u>Oregano (Golden)</u> ~ Uses in garden: great in containers, drought tolerant, fragrant, ground cover. Use in tomato dishes, rice, pasta, sauces, dressings, vinegars		
<u>Rosemary</u> ~ Sweet, hint of lemon and pine. Uses: Casseroles, fish, fruit salads, lamb, chicken, soups, stuffings, tomato sauce		
<u>Sage</u> ~ Musty, minty, slightly bitter, "sausage" flavor. Uses: Chicken, duck, goose, pork, sausages, stuffings		
<u>English Thyme</u> ~ Very aromatic, minty, tea-like. Uses: Fish, meats, poultry, soups, stocks, vegetables (eggplants, mushrooms, potatoes and summer squash)		
<u>Lemon Thyme (Variegated)</u> ~ beautiful golden variegated leaves with a strong lemon flavor. Use for meat, fish, pasta, pizza, and oils.

{PERENNIALS}	Quantity	Total Cost
Ajuga (Burgundy Glow, Black Scallop) ~ One of the most indispensable groundcovers around. It has many uses and looks great much of the year. Also known as carpetweed or bugleweed. Individual plants grow as a rosette, but they intertwine to form a solid carpet that withstands some foot traffic.

Baby's Breath Ground Cover (White) ~ beautiful bedding plant that can fill your garden area with tiny clouds of white showy flowers		
Candy Tuft (White) ~ Excellent edging plant for borders, paths or walkways. Rock gardens or sprawl over a wall. Interesting ground cover for small, sunny areas.		
Coral Bells (Marvelous Marbles, Melting Fire, Sioux Falls) ~ Airy flower spikes on wiry stems above low-growing, often dramatic foliage. Another common name is alum root.

Japanese Pachysandra (Green, Variegated) ~ Ground cover for shade areas. Excellent selection for shaded areas under shallow-rooted trees.

Vinca Vine [Periwinkle] (Major, Minor, Variegated) ~ Very fast growing, trailing vine that grows green and white leaves and blooms with delicate violet trumpet like flowers. Will not climb surfaces, but can be strung over wires or other such mediums; Good ground cover.
