Please read and adhere to these rules to avoid contention and possible disqualification.

- 1. Take in for exhibits will be on Sunday, September 25, from 2 pm to 5 pm. Exhibitors must enter items in person unless the items have been pre-registered.
- 2. Due to lack of space, exhibitors will be limited to 20 items total that can be entered in the fair.
- 3. Registration form <u>MUST</u> be completed prior to exhibit entry.
- 4. Pre-registration is available and encouraged (especially if you have multiple items). Just bring your completed registration form (no items) to the Cooperative Extension Center before September 21. Pre-registering will speed up the exhibit entry process tremendously.
- 5. Youth exhibitors' ages 5 to 8 years old will be awarded a participation ribbon only—no premiums will be paid.
- **6.** Changes to food preservation:

All products must be processed according to recognized safe methods. All jars, except dried fruits and vegetables, must be labeled on the side of the jar as to content, processing method (pressure canner, boiling water bath or drying method) and processing time. ENTRIES WILL BE DISQUALIFIED IF NOT LABELED. (See sample label pg. 10)

- 1. Exhibitors may make only one entry in each category.
- 2. All entries must be grown/made by the exhibitor.
- 3. <u>Must be present to enter exhibit(s) unless pre-registered at the Wilkes Cooperative Extension Center.</u>
- 4. Entries cannot have previously been entered in the fair.
- 5. All entries must have been grown, made, baked and/or canned between October, 2015, and October, 2016.
- 6. Take in for entries will be on Sunday, September 25, 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.
- 7. Entries will be judged on Monday, September 26, starting at 9 a.m. The public will not be admitted until judging is complete.
- 8. Entries and any ribbons/premiums awarded must be picked up on Sunday, October 2, from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. Any entries left after October 2 will become property of the Rotary Club.
- 9. The right is reserved to refuse entry of any exhibit that does not conform with the above rules, or guidelines for a specific category.
- 10. No premiums will be awarded for inferior quality entries. The decision of the judges is final!

Department L FOOD CONSERVATION

(See General Guidelines)

- 1. Use black felt-tip pen to mark year "2016" on jar lid.
- 2. All jars should be standard brand name pint, quart, 1 1/2 pint, or half-pint, with standard piece lid; clean, new and sealed. PLEASE USE "NEW" RING WITH FLAT LID. (Make sure ring is on the jar with flat lid.)
- 3. Jars should be LABELED near the bottom of the front giving NAME OF PRODUCT. DO NOT INCLUDE NAME OF EXHIBITOR.
- 4. All entries must have been prepared by the exhibitors between October, 2015-2016. Exhibits that have been entered in a previous fair will be disqualified.
- 5. Judges may open jars for tasting.
- 6. The right is reserved to destroy all products that have deteriorated.
- 7. All products must be processed according to recognized **safe methods found in the current edition of the USDA Complete Guide to Home Canning or the Ball Blue Book, or So Easy to Preserve (Cooperative Extension Georgia)
- 8. All jars, except dried fruits and vegetables, must be labeled on the side of the jar as to content, processing method (pressure canner, boiling water bath, or drying method) and processing time. ENTRIES WILL BE DISQUALIFIED IF NOT LABELED.

Appearance: Has even, golden brown color and good shape. Looks tender and good. Texture: Fine even grain, small thin cell walls, light for size, crisp crust. Crumb: Creamy white color, slightly moist, light and elastic, tender. Flavor: Good well blended flavor, pleasing.

- P-3 Corn Bread (1/2 cake)
