STRAWBERRY VARIETY INFORMATION CHART – All are good for eating, freezing and jam.

Variety	Season	Berry Size	Yield	Flavor	Remarks
Jewel	May-June	Med -Large	High	Excellent	Some Disease Resistance
Earliglow	May-June	Large	High	Very Good	Some Disease Resistance Produces lots of runners
Allstar	May-June	Large	High	Very Good - Excellent	Some Disease Resistance Pale red fruit color
Seascape	Everbearing/ Day-neutral*	Very Large	High	Excellent	Hardy
Albion	Spring and late Summer Crop*	Large	High	Very Good	Some Disease Resistance Ships well

**Day-neutral cultivars can potentially produce flower buds, and fruit can be harvested about every six weeks regardless of day length. Hot, dry weather will decrease production. Recommend growing a combination of June-bearing and day-neutral to extend harvest May-October.*

RABBITEYE BLUEBERRY VARIETY INFORMATION CHART

Variety	Season	Berry Size	Flavor	Chilling Hour Requirements	Best Use
Vernon	June	Large	Excellent	500 to 550 hours	Eating, Freezing
Premier	Mid-June	Medium-Large	Good	550 hours	Eating, Freezing
Powderblue	Late June-July	Medium	Good	550-650 hours	Eating

***Note:** Since cultivated blueberries are partly self-sterile, it's best to plant at least 2 varieties for good cross-pollination. Plant Premier with Vernon and/or Powderblue for cross-pollination. Plant on sites below 2,500 ft.*

Red (Heritage)	Spring and fall crop	High	Medium	Very Good	Suited to most climates	Eating, Jam
Black (Jewel)	July-August	Medium	Large	Good	Winter hardy	Eating, Freezing

Samdal	August-Sept	Large Fruit Clusters	Will Fruit 2 nd Year	Pies, Jellies, and Wine
Samyl	August-Sept	Medium-Large Fruit Clusters	Will Fruit 2 nd Year	Pollinator for Samdal

***Note:** Since cultivated elderberry plants are partly self-sterile, it's best to plant more than one variety in a planting to ensure cross-pollination.*

FIG INFORMATION CHART

Variety	Season	Yield	Size	Flavor	Remarks	Best Use
Brown Turkey	August-Sept	Fair-Good	Medium-Large	Very Good	Can be injured by hard freezes	Eating, Preserves

***Note:** Brown Turkey will produce a crop on sucker wood if injured by freeze, which is possible in our area with the potential of late spring frosts. Important to mulch base of tree during winter to help protect the crown. These figs are not recommended for higher elevations in the county.*
