Project Records

And it's crunch time - Project Record Books are due Jan 9 at our County Council meeting. Here are some tips to keep in mind as you complete the forms.

My 4-H Story

10% of score

This is where you get to share all about your 4-H career. What got you started? What are your interests? How have they changed? If this is your first year in 4-H or your first time doing a record, just tell about yourself. If you have done this before, take last year's story and add to it., tweak it, improve it along the way. That's why doing a Project Record is so important! High School Juniors & Seniors - you can treat this as a college or scholarship essay. Just tell your story. If you are doing more than one project record (on different topics) this can be the same for all of them, so make sure to touch on all project topics!

Section 3 - The Meat and Potatoes

35%

This is the main part of your project record (Read - it is worth the most points in scoring). It should showcase all that you did pertaining to this specific project topic. If you are doing more than project topic, then these should be different for each, but you may have some overlap. Follow the format suggested in the form. You are welcome to type it on a separate sheet of paper or just edit the document on the computer. Pay attention to formatting! Don't forget to label everything as directed (read the directions!).

Community Service, Leadership and Citizenship 30%


Youth 4-H Age 12 and under, this all falls under one category. Make a nice table and fill in with the appropriate information. Make sure to read and follow all directions! If you have questions about what goes where, just ask your fellow 4-H'ers, your 4-H Club Leader or your 4-H Agent.

Supporting Documents - The Fun stuff

10%

Showcase your pictures, ribbons, project items and all of the "Proof" that you actually did the project. Don't get too caught up in making it scrapbook quality (it's only worth 10% of your score), but spend some time adding captions, borders for your pictures and embellishments to make it look nice.

Money, Money, Money

Project Record Books are the best at practicing organization and record keeping - you will get better every year you do one! Plus - there is a HUGE incentive - Money! You can earn up to \$20 (\$10 per record) just for turning one in. Those that go on to earn gold at the district level can earn \$50. Plus you get all of the cool honors of being recognized at Achievement Night!

What is a Project?

4-H Projects

A 4-H Project is a collection of experiences that give focus to your 4-H Year. When youth say, "I'm doing a 4-H Horse Project" it means they are doing all they can to learn about horses that calendar year.

Project Record Book

A Project Record Book is where you document your growth in your learning on whatever topic you chose for your project. There is a specific format provided by NC 4-H to follow.

Why do a 4-H Project (and Record)?

A 4-H Project helps youth to stay focused. 4-H offers tons of opportunities to learn and it's a pretty big world out there. Selecting a projects helps parents, leaders, and your 4-H agent to share events that you are specifically interested in. Select that project on your 4-H Online profile and you will get specific information about upcoming events tailored just to you.

Completing a project record book helps build life skills of communication, record-keeping, data analysis, reflection, time management, responsibility and goal-setting. Then, there is also the money. The Cabarrus 4-H Foundation offers \$10 for each project record (up to 2) you complete. Contests are also held to recognize county and district winners. These winners win ribbons, certificates, pins and even money!

SUMMER INTERN

Now accepting applications for our 4-H Summer Intern. Must be at least 18 years old. Position includes a stipend. Responsibilities include registration paperwork, reminder calls, supervision of Summer Leaders during some classes. Four office hours weekly plus 4 or more day camp responsibilities.

NC 4-H HONOR CLUB

Each year, 0.5% of the state 4-H club members are eligible to join the honorable ranks of NC 4-H Honor Club. Check https://nc4h.ces.ncsu.edu/youth-3/4-h-teen-programs/nc-4-h-honor-club/ to see if you qualify. Applications are due Feb 1.
