This year has flown by for me, as I'm sure it has for many of you. Some of you have been hard at work on your project books throughout the year while others might just be getting started. It's not too late to do a project book for 2014, even if you're just hearing about it for the first time. Completing a project record book will give you an opportunity to reflect on what you've accomplished this year and record the skills you've developed and the experiences you've had in a portfolio. Project record books encourage you to set goals and develop plans to meet those goals. 4-H Portfolios (for 13-18 year olds only) are very similar to a project record except they are more comprehensive and cover up to 3 years' worth of work in a project area.


