

Hotel and Accommodations

In accordance with State 4-H Horse Advisory Council recommendations, we have negotiated a reduced rate standard room with Wingate by Wyndham (PNC/NC STATE) for \$77.00 per night plus tax. 45 rooms have been reserved for the State Show on a first-come basis. IMPORTANT: 2017 Southern Regional 4-H Horse Show entries will close PROMPTLY AT 12:00 Noon at the State 4-H Horse Show Office on Sunday July 9, 2017. All entries must be submitted by this deadline and location. NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED **BEYOND THE 12:00 Noon DEAD-**LINE. All 4-H members, regardless of participation at the State Show, including points earned, are eligible to enter the Southern Regional 4-H Horse Show and must do so by the 12 noon deadline whether they have or have not finished showing. Priority will be given to entries according to rules listed in the 4-H Horse Program Rules and

Regulations Manual. If at the end of the show, the 4-H member no longer intends on showing at Southern Regionals or does not qualify, entries and checks will be returned. EHH must be notified of any changes, scratches, or cancellations prior to 9:00 am on Tuesday July 11, 2017. All North Carolina Southern Regional delegation members will continue to receive the traditional NC 4-H Horse Program T-shirt at the event. In addition, one spot is reserved in the Southern Regionals delegation for a 4-H member that would like to compete in the Roping events. Positively Taylor- Extension Horse Husbandry's student worker for the past two and half years recently graduated from NCSU and is getting ready to start her next chapter in life! Taylor fills us in on her future plans shares some words of wisdom.



Job Title and Place of Employment: Starting in June, I will be the Administrative Support Specialist for the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences at NC State University. I'll be right up the street from where I spent the last three vears or so with Extension Horse Husbandry!

What years were you in NC 4-**H?** I was in 4-H from 2009-2014.

What activities/contests did you participate in? I participated in almost all of the educational contests. I competed nationally in Hippology (2010), Horse Bowl (2012), and Horse Judging (2012). I also had the opportunity to represent NC 4-H at the AQHYA World's contests in Horse Bowl, Horse Judging, and Team Demonstration in 2013. I participated in the photography contest and showed a friend's horse in the Southeast District in 2013, as well. I think the only things I didn't hit were the public speaking and creative writing contests!

What are your favorite memo**ries from 4-H?** There are entirely too many to count! The entire trip to Mississippi for the 2011 Southern Regionals was a riot (we ate entirely too much from Paula Deen's buffet on multiple occasions), driving across the county to

Louisiana and Oklahoma for Southern Regionals and Youth World's in 2013 was the ultimate road trip, and hosting the 2014 Southern Regionals in Raleigh was something I'll never forget- especially hiding the team demonstration mannequin, 8-finger Pete, around the show grounds and having it turn into a wild goose chase with other states to get him back! I have made lifelong friends (there were a bunch of us who teamed back up to compete in the collegiate judging contest at the Quarter Horse Congress in 2016) and gained skills and experiences that have helped me throughout college and, now, after college, too. There is nothing that could replace the time I spent in the NC 4-H Horse Program.

What advice do you have for all the current 4-H'ers? Do as much as you can, within reason. Don't burn yourself out, but take advantage of the opportunities you have to compete and participate in a variety of events and activities. You have a limited amount of time in 4-H, so see all that you can see, experience all that you can, and make as many friends as you meet. Don't be afraid to go outside of your comfort zone and participate or horse judging. The skills that you develop doing those events will be useful your entire life. Ask questions, listen, and absorb every ounce of information that comes your way- you are surrounded by experts in the horse industry... take advantage of that! Overall, though, keep your eyes and judging pad up, count your reining spins on your fingers, and remember that fun is secondary and winning is primary (just kidding... kinda).

What do you wish you knew before you started college? I wish I had known that it's okay to relax once in a while and that overcommitting does more harm than good. Time management is everything! You have to let yourself adjust to college and part of that is having a little bit of down time. I got better with this as the years passed, but freshman year was definitely a learning experience in regards to over commitment.

What part of your involvement in the NC 4-H Horse Program has helped you most in

life? Definitely the public speaking skills I developed through the communications contests and through giving oral reasons in horse judging. You don't realize how often you utilize those skills in the professional world and I'm very thankful for opportunities that taught me how to effectively and efficiently communicate with others in a variety of settings. Additionally, learning the science, anatomy, physiology, management, and much more that we studied for horse bowl and hippology helped me endlessly in my Animal Science major. While many of my classmates were struggling to understand how a muscle contracts, I was able to sleep a little easier the night in public speaking, demonstrations, before my test in anatomy and physiology.

> If you were an animal, what would you be? My boyfriend told me one day, "You know how people say dogs are like their owners? Well, that works for you and Sailor." She's a 1 year-old beagle. When asked to explain, he said, "You both are really stubborn, do whatever you set your mind to, and love everyone around you." So, I'd say I'm pretty content with that description.


will be removed.

Getting Longer Strides: Teach Your Horse to Lengthen Its Stride at the Walk, Jog, and Lope

2017 NC State 4-H Horse Show Stall Decorating Contest

A new event for the 2017 NC State 4-H Horse Show is a stall decorating contest. There will be an entry form sent out with the county stall assignments (mid-June) that must be returned by June 30, indicating the stall numbers to be judged within a county delegation. The entire delegation does not have to participate. There will be a small, medium, and large division (based on the number of stalls in the group). The break down within divisions will be announced after entries have been received. Stalls must be ready to be judged on Friday morning at 8:00 AM and the winners will be announced at the opening ceremonies Friday night. Decorations should remain up through noon on Saturday. Stalls will be judged on the following criteria: 40% Neatness & Eye Appeal (Eye catching design and visual appeal); 30% Originality & Creativity (Exceptional use of creative ideas and originality to the design); 30% Craftsmanship (Well-constructed and neat materials).
