PLANT INFORMATION

BLUEBERRIES (*Two varieties needed for cross pollination.*)

Rabbiteye

Tifblue – Early-mid-season, berries hold well. Best standard plant.

Powderblue – Late season, sweet fruit and highly productive.

Premier – Early/mid-season, excellent flavor and highly productive.

Pink Lemonade (*New Blueberry this year, in 3 gallon pot*)

A stunning ornamental pink blueberry that bears delicious blueberries. This unique berry matures to a bright pink color and offers a flavorful treat. The plant produces showy pink flowers in spring and gold/orange foliage in fall. It ripens in late July or early August. Although self-pollinating, it is recommended to plant 2 for better fruit setting.

STRAWBERRIES

Earliglow -Ripens late May-June, great for fresh eating, jams and freezing. Earliglow is vigorous and disease resistant.

Albion - Produces very large fruit that is mostly conical, very firm and red in color. Its flavor is very good for a day-neutral. To get the high yields it is capable of producing, this variety will need a stronger watering and nutrient program than any other ever bearer. Wider plant spacing will deliver the largest berries.

BLACKBERRIES (*thornless*)

Arapaho -Large, very firm with excellent flavor. Erect and self-supporting vines. Will compliment Navaho.

Navaho - Large, sweet and firm berries. Erect and self-supporting vines.

RED RASPBERRIES (*self-pollinating*)

Nantahala -This is a new variety from North Carolina State University. A primocane type Raspberry that is very late which should help some of the Southern growers to avoid sun scald and excessive heat damage. This variety is rated as very sweet and ripens starting the first part of September.

MUSCADINES

Late Frye- This muscadine variety is a late season grape that is bronze and self-fertile. It produces delicious fruit. The muscadine fruit is large in size and is very vigorous with high yields. This variety was developed at Ison's Nursery. Patent Protected #9224.

Ison – Black variety muscadine that is self-fertile. The Ison is sweet and has excellent fruit size and production. Fruit ripens uniformly early to mid-season. Fruit is great for all uses - fresh, juice, wine, or jelly. This was developed at Ison's Nursery. Patent Protected #5822.

APPLES TREES

Golden Delicious- Pollinates others and is self-pollinating. Fruit is crisp, extra juicy. Golden Delicious has tender skin, good for eating and baking.

Stayman Winesap - Has medium bright to deep red speckled skin. The apples' flesh is firm, yellow, crisp and tangy. Stayman Winesap apples are great for desserts, juice or canning. It is a great lunch apple that keeps well. The Stayman Winesap apple tree is an early bearer **that needs a pollinator**. Ripens September through October.

Gala - One of the most popular new varieties; sweet taste, firm and crisp texture. Will pollinate others.

PAWPAW TREES

Native Pawpaw - The taste of a pawpaw fruit has been described as a cross between an apple or mango and banana with a creamy texture. The fruit can be eaten raw or used to make desserts. Pawpaw is a small, deciduous tree that is native to this area. Although self-pollinating, it is recommended to plant 2 for better fruit set.
